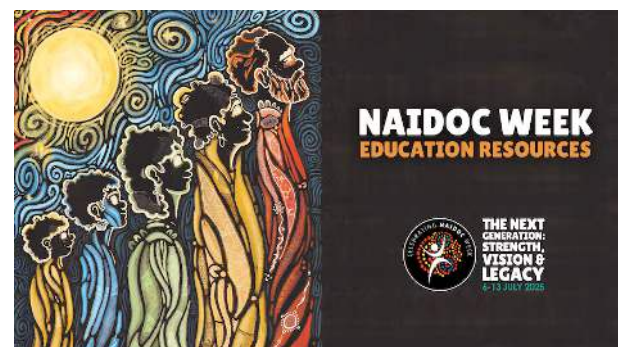
Church Dinner Coming Up
